FAMILY CLINIC HOURS CHANGE: Starting on Monday, April 13, the MDH Family Clinic will change its hours of operation. The new hours Monday through Friday are from 8 a.m. until 5 p.m. This new schedule **DOES NOT** change the MDH Convenience Clinic hours.

The MDH Family Clinic staff will contact patients who may have appointment times changed due to the new schedule. The regular scheduled hours of operation will resume after the pandemic is over.

STORAGE CONTAINERS ARRIVE: The first two storage containers arrived at the McDonough District Hospital parking lot on Wednesday. These containers, painted white with a red cross, are placed on both sides of the drive-thru screening station to provide shelter for the staff from the elements and help shield the screening station from the wind, while also allowing for equipment storage capabilities.

TWO POSITIVES IN SURROUNDING COUNTIES: It was announced on Wednesday that Hancock and Schuyler County each recorded its first positive COVID-19 case.

REMINDER FROM THE McDONOUGH COUNTY ESDA and HEALTH DEPARTMENT:

The McDonough County Emergency Services and Disaster Agency (ESDA) sent out a reminder on Wednesday morning.

"We know it is nice outside, but if you have to go out, please maintain social distance. If you can, enjoy the warmth within your porch or backyard. We are making progress, but we must continue to flatten the curve. We are all in this together and together we will overcome."

McDonough County agencies also remind the public during Easter weekend it is important to stay committed to social distancing and avoid large in-person gatherings. People are encouraged to:

- Search their place of worship's website, Facebook page, or other social media outlets and check to see if it offers a virtual service.
 - Celebrate the weekend with family via a video chat.
- Continue avoiding large crowds and plan a larger gathering with family and friends after the pandemic is over.
