

Over 400 meals were served at the Big Game Party on Friday, February 3! Thank you to the fantastic servers and to Morrison for catering.





Hand Hygiene

Promote a Culture of Safety with a Simple Phrase "IT TAKES TWO"

Hand hygiene takes only a few seconds, but can have a profound effect on the safety of our patients. In healthcare, we may sometimes wash our hands hundreds of times throughout a shift. During the busy hustle of the day, have you ever thought of how many opportunities of hand hygiene we missed? Even when we do our best, we can miss opportunities and put our patients and ourselves at risk. We do not see the immediate consequences of our missed hand hygiene moments, but it does not change the impact those missed opportunities may have. We need teamwork in order for us as a healthcare facility to successfully treat our patients and keep them safe from harm while they are under our care.

The "It Takes Two" phrase is a simple reminder to your co-worker to perform hand hygiene. It could be our family, friends, loved ones or ourselves we find on the receiving end of our care. Think of this with each patient encounter to help avoid drift in hand hygiene. Build a culture of safety by speaking up for our patients and remind each other to perform hand hygiene.

A representative from MDH visits the classroom to educate students about various departments at the hospital.



	Welcome to the new version of Family Feud. Actually, extreme divisiveness has been present in
	American politics for decades. Consider taking a trip to the fabulous Lincoln Museum in Springfield where
	numerous satirical cartoons are on display showing the mudslinging between Lincoln and Douglas supporters
	during the campaign of 1858. What's different nowadays is we receive news as it happens and are able to respond
	almost immediately via social media. When we respond quickly we tend to be more emotional; we don't stop to
	think through what we want to say nor the repercussions of our words.
	If it's possible, ask that there be a truce on political talk during your vacation. Remind everyone of the true
-	purpose of getting together; to be with family, to relax and to have fun. If you don't think such a suggestion will
	be well received, there are a few different tactics you may wish to use. Scripting responses ahead of time so you
	feel prepared to respond thoughtfully might help. Come up with ways you might subtly change the topic or be
	able to offer a diplomatic comment such as, "I hope he does well" since failing doesn't seem like a good option
	for any of us. If necessary, step away from bickering between others as it's not your issue to battle.

Changing Your Tax Withholdings

Now that tax season is among us, you may want to adjust your tax withholdings or change tax exemptions. To make these changes, complete a Federal and/or Illinois W-4 form. Human Resources has these forms available to employees.

An alternative way to reduce your taxable income is by increasing your pre-tax pension contribution. Your retirement contributions can be deducted from your paycheck on a pre-tax basis for federal and state withholdings.

We know electronic health records, EHR's, improve the quality, safety and efficiency of health care.

We want staff to have confirmation of how this is happening at MDH through our partnership with Cerner.

Therefore, each month in Making Rounds, the MDH/ MMG Cerner resident experts will provide examples of information and data to help us all see the advantages of Cerner and a networked EHR.

Since go-live, nursing has decreased their time in chart per patient by 29%, while providers have had a 43% decrease.

The MDH Board of Directors met February 20. Here is Mr. Boyd's report to the Board for the accounting period of January 17 -February 20, 2017.



Quality and Innovation

Service Excellence

Service Excellence worked together with MDH and MMG Cerner resident experts along with Public Relations, to compose articles for the upcoming editions of Vital Signs and Health Connection to promote the advantages of an electronic health record.

The article will highlight the benefits of working with an innovative partner such as Cerner, as well as the advantages to the patient in the areas of safety, quality, coordination of care and convenience.

By reaching out to the general public via these publications and emphasizing the advantages, it is believed the level of understanding and confidence in the EHR system will improve.

Projects

- Phlebotomy Wait Times: The project is moving to document the process changes into the standard procedures for the lab and registration. Final wait time results will be obtained before the project closes. Monitoring of the wait times will continue for several months after the project closes.

Patient Safetu

- MDH submitted a project entitled "Reducing Bacteria in the Nose" for the second annual Quality Advocacy Showcase on Wednesday, April 5, 2017 at the Capital in Springfield, IL. The event offers IHA members the opportunity to engage legislators in discussions about the key quality issues addressed in the Illinois General Assembly while highlighting performance achievements. Collectively, the showcase aims to actively demonstrate our healthcare community's contribution to advancing quality care and patient safety across the state.
- As a member of the Midwest Alliance for Patient Safety (MAPS) Patient Safety Organization (PSO), MDH has been provided with educational information to improve patient safety through learning events and tools. Currently, MDH is collecting and reporting fall data in preparation for the Falls Safe Table in March.
- MDH has joined the Michigan, Illinois and Wisconsin Hospitals Partner for Quality Improvement Program: Hospital Improvement Innovation Network (HIIN). The HIIN Starter Packs are now available and intended to meet our immediate needs by jumpstarting our current improvement efforts. Gap analyses have been conducted to identify areas of opportunity related to the HACs.

Infection Control

 A new tagging process for patient care equipment was implemented in January that identifies whether patient care equipment is clean or needs disinfected. The new Stage TAG color coded process tracks the usage cycle of equipment from "Clean" to "In Use" to "Soiled". The new process improves patient safety by clearly identifying properly disinfected equipment.

Physician Recruitment/Retention

Physician and Provider Recruitment Update:

OB/GYN: Dr. Amerson began with MDH on Monday, February 13, 2017. She is currently working through orientation activities at this time. We are continuing to work on credentialing as well as finalizing her licensure. A practicing candidate from Kansas has tentatively agreed to a site visit in March 2017.

Hospitalist: We have extended a draft, part-time, proposal to a recent interim provider that performed well during their time with us in January. The candidate is settling into a full-time practice opportunity within the Chicago area. We hope to have a final decision on working for us part-time by the end of February 2017.

Pediatrician: The search continues for this specialty. We are utilizing a variety of contingency as well as in-house recruitment resources for this search. Within the past two weeks, a 2000 plus direct mail campaign to Pediatricians training or practicing within the midwest region was completed.

Psychiatry Nurse Practitioner:

We recently received an expression of interest for a candidate that will be completing her Psychiatry Nurse Practitioner training program this summer. Initial phone interviews are being coordinated at this time.

Provider Outreach

Drs. Wehner and Zhang attended the Ag Mech Show at WIU in February 2017. Both physicians provided complimentary, osteopathic manipulations for interested participants. Other services included Care Coordinators providing blood pressure checks in addition to Outreach health educators providing grip strength assessments.

Employer Outreach

The Regional Office of Education has chosen to utilize MMG Family Clinic and it's providers for new teacher, substitute teachers and bus driver physicals. In March, Adrian MacGregor will be speaking with area school principals at the R.O. E. office regarding the process and cost structure. Hiring continues at NTN Bower. Krystal Wagner and Kaye Stone are providing pre-employment physicals at Convenient Care clinic. Rehabilitation Services is finalizing the necessary steps to incorporate a preplacement screening for certain NTN Bower positions.

Information Systems

Cerner Update

The additional training sessions with physicians and the Power Chart Maternity demonstration were completed in Early February. Feedback for both training and the Maternity demonstration were positive.

We continue to work with Cerner on the transition plan for Dr. Mitchell's office to our Cerner configuration. We are awaiting a contract language update from Cerner to provide the appropriate transition for Dr. Mitchell's office setup in our version of Cerner.

In review of the time it takes for nursing and physicians using Cerner to perform their charting. We have seen a decrease in the nurse charting time of 29% and a decrease in the charting time for physicians of 43%. This should show that staff are becoming more familiar with the applications and increasing their efficiency in performing their tasks. There are still improvements to be made in this area, but does show that we are making progress.

Financial Performance

January 2017

We ended the month with a positive bottom line, \$1,786,889 primarily from lower deductions from revenue (or discounts) and some strengthening of the revenues as we catchup backlogs from our Cerner transition. Volumes are still mixed. Inpatient volumes, with the exception of Swing Beds, generally remain down. While ED visits have generally been below budget for the year, January numbers were similar to December running about 21.9% below budget and impacting other key departments like Radiology as well. Expenses were a bit over budget in total most notable in Employee Benefits, Professional Fees and Insurance Expense. Though a nice change from the first six months of the fiscal year, we are still at a \$1.4M loss year to date.



Free Hemoccult Test Kits

March is Colorectal Cancer Awareness month. Excluding skin cancers, colorectal cancer is the third most common cancer diagnosed both in men and women in this country.

Hemoccult-ICT test kits are the first step in detecting colorectal cancer. This kit only detects bleeding from the lower GI tract and is superior in detecting colorectal cancer. The Hemoccult-ICT is a screening, not a diagnosis for colorectal cancer. Free test kits are available from March 1 to April 28. Simply stop by Outreach Services in HSB1, Suite 302 to pick up a kit. Office hours are Monday through Friday, 8:00 AM to 12:00 PM and 1:00 PM to 4:30 PM. Before or after hours, test kits can be obtained from the MDH Admitting/Registration Department.

The Hemoccult-ICT test kit checks for blood in your bowel movement (stool) and is completed in the privacy of your home. There are NO dietary restrictions and instructions will be included with the kit. The completed kit may be mailed back in the envelope provided to the MDH Lab, which will conduct a free analysis if the kit is returned by Friday, April 28.
