

### Looking for Advice?

Dear Lucy,

My 32-year-old daughter is participating in counseling to address unresolved feelings she has related to her having been sexually abused by her grandfather when she was in grade school. We took her to see a therapist at the time but she wasn't open to talking about what happened to her. Her father and I are relieved she is now connected with a therapist she trusts to talk about this past problem. Recently she explained she is beginning something called EMDR which we had never heard of. Frankly, we're concerned this is one of those trendy treatments that could lead to further trauma for her. Can you reassure us she's doing the right thing?

Dear Mom,
The fact that your daughter is sharing her counseling experiences with you reflects the close relationship you have
with her. Eye Movement Desensitization and Reprocessing (EMDR) is an intervention developed by psychologist
Dr. Francine Shapiro for trauma victims. In therapy the patient is asked to focus on past stressful events and then
through the use of bilateral eye movements or other types of alternative stimulation of the right and left sides of
the brain, the distressful memory can be interpreted in a more detached manner.
The belief is when a person, like your daughter, experiences a traumatic event intense emotions stop the
individual from completely comprehending what has happened and consequently that experience becomes
"frozen in time." When recalling the event your daughter may re-experience the trauma all over again because
everything that happened to her including sounds, smells and sights connected with the situation remain frozen
in her mind and are re-triggered in her body.
Within the EMDR session the patient is asked to recall the past disturbing events while focusing on the bilateral
stimuli provided by the therapist. This might include side-to-side eye movements, hand tapping or auditory tones
Although no one is completely sure how the therapy works, it appears to directly affect the brain "unfreezing"
the traumatic memories and allowing the patient to reframe the experience. The negative emotions and bodily
reactions (the fight, flight or freeze response) connected to the event can then be desensitized. The therapy is
continued until the memory becomes less disturbing and the trauma is no longer interfering in everyday life. You
daughter will be able to recall the trauma but her mind and body will no longer relive the experience.
EMDR has been shown to be an effective form of treatment for people who have experienced major traumas in
their lives such as physical, emotional or sexual abuse or sexual assault, combat experience, an accident or sudder
loss of a loved one.
EMDR therapists must undergo extensive training and are certified to provide this therapy. Behavioral Health
Services has two Licensed Clinical Professional Counselors who are qualified to provide this type of counseling.

#### President's Report

The MDH Board of Directors met March 23, 2015. Here is Mr. Boyd's report to the Board for the accounting period of February 17 through March 23, 2015.



#### Quality and Innovation

#### Service Excellence

February Service Excellence Committee meetings resulted in the approval of define and measure tollgates for two chartered outpatient Improvement Teams focusing on the reduction of wait times for tests and treatments.

#### Details include:

- Cardiopulmonary Goal:
  - To decrease the number of unscheduled echocardiogram and vascular study outpatients waiting in excess of 30 minutes from order to first image from 41% defective to 20%.
  - Current Metric: February 23%
  - Improvement Actions:
     Revision of diagnostic schedule patterns to leave open spaces for unscheduled patients.
- Radiology Goal: To reduce the number of patients waiting in excess of 40 minutes for A) the completion of a mammogram and B) the number of patients waiting in excess of 40 minutes from mammography completion to the start of additional diagnostic testing, if applicable.
  - Baseline = 25% defective
  - Current Metric: Jan/Feb A) = 6% B) = 50%
  - Improvement Actions:
     Increased daily appointment range by one hour; reduced schedule testing time from 60 to 30 minutes, thereby increasing additional openings

to accommodate unscheduled diagnostic testing following mammograms.

#### Projects

## CHARGE ENTRY FOR MMG REVENUE CYCLE

The team goal is 100% of all MMG visits billed by MMG Patient Financial Services (MMG-PFS). In February, 94% of the 4,114 MMG visits were billed by MMG-PFS. The surgeon group, WISA, is scheduled to start its billing by MMG-PFS on May 1, 2015.

#### PATIENT PORTAL

As of February, the portal was functioning well with 92% of inpatient health records online within 36 hours; our goal is 50% or more. Inpatient use of the portal by viewing, downloading or transmitting their health record was at 8%; which barely meets our goal of 5% or more. The first quarterly drawing for a \$50 chamber of commerce gift certificate was sent to the winning inpatient. The next quarter's drawing will occur after the end of March.

#### HOME TO STAY

The reduction of 30 day readmissions is the business problem our team is working on. The team is auditing compliance to discharge instructions for CHF patients.

#### Patient Safety

MDH has been selected to be one of 10 hospitals to receive education and technical assistance through the Agency for Healthcare Research and Quality (AHRQ) Fall Prevention Program. MDH was chosen out of 80 hospitals nationally through a rigorous evaluation process including goals for improvement, readiness to undertake the improvement initiative and leadership support. The AHRQ is leading the patient safety initiative to help hospitals reduce the incidence of falls and harm occurred by falls. This federally funded project is offered free to qualifying hospitals. The initiative is a two year commitment project with ongoing in person workshops, webinars and regular conference calls. The conference calls will begin in March and the first in person workshop will take place in April or May.

#### Infection Control

The hospital has standardized the use of disposable blood pressure cuffs for patient use. Once the patient receives their designated blood pressure cuff, it will travel with them throughout their hospital stay. This standardization removes potential risks associated with reusable blood pressure cuffs that travel from patient room to patient room.

#### Physician Recruitment/Retention

Physician, Advance Practice Provider Recruitment & Outreach Services – Update:

#### Outpatient Primary Care

Adrian MacGregor and Dr. Jerome Anderson have recently conducted a phone interview as well as initial reference checks on an Outpatient Family Medicine candidate that will complete his residency program in June 2015. We have extended an invitation for a site visit and are awaiting final confirmation of the dates for the visit in April 2015. Ongoing recruitment activity continues related to primary care. We have executed a comprehensive sourcing plan with the Medicus Firm that encompasses various methods of marketing to candidates within a 250 mile radius of our service area.

#### Hospitalist Medicine

We are continuing to recruit for the second, full-time Advanced Practice Practitioner for the Hospitalist service. At this time, we are evaluating a recent expression of interest from a Physician Assistant candidate with ties to our community. Our work with Eagle continues as we search for a Hospitalist Medical Director candidate.

#### Advanced Practice Provider

Primary Care: Various on-boarding activities are taking place for Michelle Schlieper, FNP this month. She will be joining the McDonough Medical Group on April 1st, 2015 and providing support to the McDonough Medical Group - Convenient Care Clinic as well as Family Clinic locations.

**ENT:** Dr. Sparks and Adrian MacGregor will continue to evaluate one additional candidate for the practice opportunity within the ENT clinic this month.

## Outreach Services Outreach Programming

Diane Tate, Health Educator with Outreach Services, has coordinated several First Aid & CPR classes in March 2015 including Western Illinois University – Department of Kinesiology, Whalen & Yetter Manufacturing, in addition to our Macomb community class. Over 60 individuals have registered or have participated in these programs for the month of March.

#### Physician Outreach

Drs. Biagini and Ruiz will be providing a community educational program, coordinated by Outreach Services on Tuesday, March 10th – 6pm (Spoon River College Outreach Center), entitled, *Malignancies of the GI Tract:* From Top to Bottom.

#### Occupational Health

The employee wellness partnership between MDH Outreach Services and Macomb Schools continues throughout March 2015. Nicole Schaub, Health Educator with Outreach Services, has coordinated several on-site enrollment sessions for the health risk assessment portion of the program. In April 2015, Outreach Services staff as well as Laboratory Services staff will be on-site within Macomb schools to provide the bio-metric health screening service.

## Information Systems Acute Care Renovation

Additional data closet space has been created behind the elevators on 2nd and 3rd floor to accommodate the additional network infrastructure required for the newly renovated East wing.

## Patient Vital Sign Monitor Integration

We are in discussions with a replacement system for our vital signs monitor equipment in ICU, ER and telemetry. The new system will provide for better access to patients monitoring across the ICU, ER and both Second and Third floor acute areas once the new renovations are opened.

#### Financial Performance February 2015

Activity for the month was below budget by 1.2% -- though Year-to-Date above budget by 1.2% overall. Total admissions were below budget by 1.4% or 2 admissions though patient days were below budget by just 2 days. YTD we are still below both budget and last year's numbers in terms of inpatient services.

Total Patient Revenue did end the month above both fixed and flex budget due to positive variances in Emergency Services and Outpatient Ancillary services. All said, YTD patient revenue is just slightly above budget compared to both fixed and flex. While Bad Debt and Charity Care are positive to budget, the variance in Contractual Adjustments caused Total Deductions from Revenue to be negative – 13.6% above budget with OP Medicaid making up the bulk of the variance. Operating Expenses were above budget by 2.8%.

We ended the month with a positive bottom line of \$337,065 – below the monthly budget based on our activity by \$234,018 but above our fixed budget by \$307,565. Our year-to-date

net income is \$2,073,863 – above our fixed target Net Income by \$471,693 – however, below our budget based on our activity.

#### Facility Planning

#### MDH Addition and Renovation

Progress continues to go well on both fronts. Renovation on the addition is focusing on sheetrock/taping on the first floor, installation of flooring on second, and painting on third.

In the acute care renovation, work centers on installation of wall protection, casework installation, and plumbing. The footprint of the construction area has also expanded further to the west making access to the public side of the service elevator impossible at this time.

An electrical shutdown was completed Tuesday evening March 10th in order to connect the new addition to the Ameren utility grid.

#### Public Relations Report

Public Relations Report for Activities in February 2015

#### Website and Social Media

During February there were 14,674 home page visits, 3,733 career views and 3,914 calendar views. The MDH Facebook page has more than 950 followers/likes. Information includes hospital news, additions to the medical staff, healthy practices, a featured job of the week, construction updates, outreach activities, classes and events. The hospital is working with In10sity to redesign the MDH website so it can be viewed on multiple platforms and maintain design and information placement. The site was previously revised in June 2012.

#### News media

February news included receiving new equipment for the MDH Ambulance Service, presentation of \$5,000 to Linda's Fund from WIU Think Pink event and Big Pink Volleyball proceeds;

extending hours for MRI services at MDH, announcement of MDH services at the WIU Ag Mech Show, information on a March 10 free colorectal cancer education program, and classes for CPR and first aid. Dr. George Roodhouse was featured discussing MDH medical staff concerns regarding immunization and measles. His interview was on KHQA television. Hospital information and news items were published in Macomb, Bushnell, Rushville, and Fulton County weekly newspapers.

#### Advertising/Marketing

The emergency expansion project television commercial was broadcast on local television stations to promote awareness of MDH efforts to improve facilities. Other February advertising included billboards as part of a campaign to promote surgeons Card, Gonzales, Ruiz and Whitley. A notice was published announcing the closing of Dr. Sujata Karkare's practice effective March 31. Ads were placed for a March 10 free colorectal cancer education program and to encourage patients to send Thank You messages to their providers as a recognition for Doctor's Day March 30. Advertising continued to promote the addition of Dr. Tamara Smith as a hospital employed OB/GYN, surgery, orthopedic and sports medicine services by Drs. Ronald Wheeler and Scott Urch, and home health care.

#### Department Changes

Anna Schultz has been named the new leader of Public Relations effective March 23. She replaces John Maguire who retires March 20. The department is hiring a public relations specialist to work with Schultz and graphic designer Alexa Shaw.

#### Other

Staff represented MDH at the WIU Ag Mech Show Feb. 7 and 8 at Western Hall, and coordinated free blood glucose and blood pressure screenings provided by other MDH health care professionals. Outreach staff provided wellness education materials and finger

lights were given to attendees while supplies lasted. Staff coordinated MDH participation in Senior Fair from 8:30-10:30 am Feb. 5 at Citizens Bank in Macomb.

#### Foundation Report

This report reflects activity held within the month of February 2015

#### Annual Support

A total of \$47,533.82 was received; 198 gifts and 14 memorials were processed. Some of the areas receiving support include: Laboratory, Linda's Fund, Alzheimer's Support, Hospice, Women's Center, PROS, and Festival of Trees.

#### PROS

First Aid kits were received and will be given to each participant at the April 24 Farm Safety Day Camp. Plans continue for the National Hospital Week/ Membership Drive (Taco Tuesday) on May 12 and Summer Blast (TBD).

#### Golden Apple Society

The Recognition Reception was held on February 5 at the Macomb Country Club. Nearly 60 members attended the annual event and 8 Society members were recognized for their future pledges. The next meeting is scheduled for April 2.

#### Business Relations

CEO Roundtable discussions were scheduled for April 27 and May 1 to be held at SRC Outreach Center. The sessions will be an opportunity for MDH CEO Kenny Boyd to share current developments at MDH such as medical staff updates, renovation updates, new equipment, facility planning, and financial status. Work begins to create an invitation list and to prepare the mailing.

#### Planned Gifts

The committee met on February 4 to discuss content for the new Heritage Circle brochure including an updated list of planned giving opportunities. Research on past bequests to MDH was

completed and reported on a historical spreadsheet. Other community members that have named MDH in their wills were contacted and asked for a copy of their will so the amount can be entered as a pledge.

Tevar 5K Run/Walk Saturday, May 2

The committee met on February 10 to discuss race details, brochure content and logo design. Shirt samples were ordered, received, and chosen. Work continues to prepare a mailing, create ads and fliers, on-line registration, post on MDH website, and recruit volunteers.

#### Linda's Fund

Newly designed brochures were printed and distributed. A total of \$10,516.66 was received in donations for the month of February.

#### Capital Campaign

In February, the MDH Board approved a two-year \$5.5 million campaign for the future Dolores Kator Switzer Women's Center at MDH. A campaign timeline was completed to track activity. Work has begun to gather information for campaign materials such as women's services statistics at MDH, square footage of project, naming and grant opportunities, architectural renderings, prospect lists, etc.

#### Community Support

The Lady Cyclones basketball team presented a \$4,600 check to Linda's Fund from their 4th annual Paint West Prairie PINK Night. A check for \$5,840 was received from the WIU Big Pink Volleyball event. Funds were split between Linda's Fund and Cancer Education & Screening. V.I.T. South Fulton Lady Rebels donated \$1,200 to Linda's Fund from their Rebels Pink Night.

Here are some steps to protect any device connected to your home network.



Ensure all devices are protected by a strong PIN or passcode and always running the latest version of their software. Whenever possible, enable automatic updating.

If possible, have two computers at home, one for the parents and one for the kids. If you are sharing a computer, make sure you have separate accounts for everyone and that kids do not have administrator privileged access.

Computers should have a firewall and anti-virus installed, enabled and running the latest version.

Before disposing of computers or mobile devices, be sure they are wiped of any personal information. For mobile devices, this can be done by selecting the option for a secure reset of the devices.

#### Vacation Time

All employees' vacation accrual rates are based on years of service as of their benefit date. Status 2 (less than 24 hours per week) and 7 (24 hours per week) employees accrue vacation on hours worked, not including overtime hours. Status 7 employees have a minimal guarantee that is earned but may earn additional vacation based on hours worked. No minimal guarantee is received by Status 2 employees.

	Status 1(Full-time)	Status 7 (minimum accrual)
1 year to less than 5 years	80 hours	48 hours
5 years to less than 15 years	120 hours	72 hours
15 years or more	160 hours	96 hours

All vacation hours must be used by the end of the month of the employee's benefit anniversary date. The vacation amount displayed on your paycheck reflects what needs to be used by the next benefit anniversary. Contact Human Resources to determine all benefit time available to you.
