

Changing Your Tax Withholdings

Now that tax season is among us, you may want to adjust your tax withholdings or change tax exemptions. To make these changes, complete a Federal and/or Illinois W-4 form. Human Resources has these forms available to employees.

An alternative way to reduce your taxable income is by increasing your pre-tax pension contribution. Your retirement contributions can be deducted from your paycheck on a pre-tax basis for federal and state withholdings.

President's Report

The MDH Board of Directors met March 19. Here is Mr. Boyd's report to the Board for the accounting period of February 27 -March 19, 2018.



Quality

Service Excellence

The Service Excellence Department has trained 321 employees on AIDET, and Managing Up. They attended 10 different staff meetings and held 23 other training sessions.

AIDET is a framework for MDH staff to communicate with patients and their families as well as with each other. It is a simple acronym that represents a very powerful way to communicate with people who are often nervous, anxious and feeling vulnerable.

- 1. <u>A</u>cknowledge
 - Greet people with a smile and use their names if you know them. Attitude is everything. Create a lasting impression.
- 2. <u>I</u>ntroduce
 - Introduce yourself to others politely. Tell them who you are and how you are going to help them. Escort people where they need to go rather than pointing or giving directions.
- 3. <u>D</u>uration
 - Keep in touch to ease waiting times. Let others know if there is a delay and how long it will be. Make it better and apply service recovery methods when necessary.
- 4. <u>Explanation</u>
 - Advise others what you are doing, how procedures work and whom to contact if they need assistance. Communicate any steps they may need to take. Make words work. Talk, listen and learn

- 5. <u>T</u>hank you
 - Thank somebody. Foster an attitude of gratitude. Thank people for their patronage, help or assistance.

Projects

- 1. Phlebotomy Wait Times: Project is closed with latest wait times measured March 2nd to March 6th and procedures issued.
- Report Processes: Project is closed with report writing procedure issued.

Patient Safety

Representatives from the Illinois Hospital Association (IHA) and Illinois Homecare and Hospice Council (IHHC) met with the MDH Readmission Team as part of the Improvement Action Network (IAN). The purpose of the IHA-IHHC IAN is to enhance care transitions across the continuum between hospital and the home health team. During this visit, the team received intensive coaching and feedback on how to improve care transitions between their organization as well as applied science techniques that will be used to enhance care transitions for our patients.

Infection Control

- Yellow isolation door frame magnets were purchased to replace broken magnets and to insure adequate supply during increased demand as with this flu season. The isolation magnets were also introduced new to the ER to help facilitate communication of isolation patients.
- 2. Respiratory hygiene stations were purchased for HSBII as well as a new free standing respiratory hygiene station for the entrance of HSBI. The respiratory hygiene stations include hand sanitizer, masks, Kleenex and a sign about respiratory etiquette.
- 3. Additional clinics were provided

new signs about respiratory etiquette to compliment there individual hygiene components.

Physician Recruitment/Retention

Physician Recruitment and Outreach Services - Update:

Hospitalist Medicine: Plans are being finalized to incorporate Dr. Prayag Patel into the Hospitalist physician schedule, one week per month starting in April 2018. Megan Clemens, Family Nurse Practitioner has recently shifted over to the Hospitalist service on a parttime basis as well as providing limited outpatient support to MMG Family Clinic. We are excited to have these additions to the Hospitalist Program.

OB/GYN: Recently we interviewed an experienced OB/GYN who is currently practicing within Kentucky. As a follow up to the visit, we are further evaluating this candidate's interest in both a full-time and possibly part-time practice opportunity. This physician was referred to us by Eric Reinertson, MD, former interim provider for the MDH OB/GYN clinic.

Additional Psychiatry Support:

We have received and are reviewing a final proposal from a tele-psychiatry service provider that would enable us to receive physician Psychiatry call support through a model of two weekends and four week days each month. Pursuing this option would eliminate our immediate need to hire a Nurse Practitioner trained within Psychiatry as well as provide primary call support/ relief to Drs. Sarwar and Wright.

Outreach Services

Community Outreach

MDH Outreach Services in partnership with Cardiopulmonary Services, Rehabilitation Services, Radiology Services, and Morrison Food Services hosted the Get To The Heart of the Matter community outreach program. Over 35 individuals attended and received prevention education as well as tours of the Cardiopulmonary and Rehabilitation Services Department(s).

Employer Outreach

In February, Outreach Services health educators hosted Laverdiere Construction at MDH for First Aid & CPR training. Ninety six Laverdiere employees received employee training from MDH. Additional First Aid & CPR training took place at Western Grain Marketing, the Pioneer plant in Adair, MacArthur School - Macomb School District faculty & staff, and the Adair Fire Department throughout February. MDH Wellness Solutions service proposals were finalized with one regional retail store in the community and one service proposal was extended to a utility company within the service area.

Information Systems

Cerner Update

We are working with Cerner to complete our review and submission of Meaningful Use Attestation numbers for the hospital and providers.

Cerner is also working to complete data creation and submission files for the DARTNet practice performance registry that will provide some comparative data for our clinic providers. This is a requirement for our Meaningful Use attestation process for our providers.

Echo and Vascular Studies Upgrade

The initial implementation of the new ViewPoint/EchoPacs software and the new E95 ultrasound unit has been completed. Additional interfacing to automate the report completion is in process. We anticipate that we will have the interfacing completed in early April.

Financial

February 2018

We ended the month with a positive bottom line of \$145,573. Total Patient

Revenue was 9.8% above budget or \$1,605,608 for the month with again the largest positive variance being Inpatient Services due to the high inpatient census. The largest negative variances were in Emergency and Outpatient services due to soft volumes in the ED, Radiology and Therapies. Year to Date, Total Patient Revenue is 4.8% above budget or \$6.3M.

Operating Expenses were just slightly above budget by \$16,461 or 0.2%. Salaries were up by about \$129K due to both the increase in patient volumes and utilization of contract labor as we respond to the high census fluctuations. Employee Benefits were up due to increases in employee health claims. Payor mix and increase in revenue, particularly the increase in Medicare on the inpatient side drove up our Deductions from Revenue. Charity Care is above budget though still below last year year-to-date as patients. Though Bad Debt is still high, it is starting to level off.

Public Relations

News and Website Updates

During February there were 26,078 home page visits, 3,350 career views, and 15,585 calendar views.

The most-read news story for the month of February on MDH.org was the feature story on the then-upcoming "Get to the Heart of the Matter" program.

The McDonough Voice had a front page feature story on February 14 highlighting the Cardiopulmonary Unit. Heartland Health Care Center honored the Cardio Unit as "A Salute to Local Heroes" and catered in lunch for the department.

Our Twitter account gained followers during February, now at 391. Our tweets earned 11,800 impressions, averaging more than 420 per day. The most impressions of a Tweet was when MDH was recognized by Western Illinois Women's Basketball for the Think Pink event with a game ball presentation. The top media Tweet was WIU's mascot Rocky visiting MDH during a filming for a new mascot outfit. MDH will be highlighted in Western's video, scheduled to air in early March.

As 2018 marks the 60th anniversary of MDH, to honor the milestone we have shared a photo every Thursday for #TBT (Throwback Thursday). 

Wear Blue for Colorectal Cancer

Colorectal cancer is the third most commonly diagnosed cancer in the world. Among cancers that affect both men and women, colorectal cancer is the second leading cancer killer in the United States. It doesn't have to be. In 2000, President Clinton dedicated March as Colorectal Cancer Awareness month, by assigning the dark blue ribbon as the color for this cause. Colorectal cancer month can make a difference by educating the public and take action towards prevention.

What is colorectal cancer?

Colorectal cancer is a cancer that occurs in the colon or rectum. Most colorectal cancers begin as polyps. Polyps are growths in the inner lining of the colon or rectum. The polyps associated with causing colorectal cancer are adenomatous polyps. Once cancer grows in the inner lining of the large intestine, it can spread into the wall of the colon or rectum. Cancer that grows in the wall can penetrate blood or lymph vessels spreading into one's lymph nodes.

How to prevent colorectal cancer

If you are at increased risk for colorectal cancer, you should begin screening before the age of 50. Those at an increased risk are people who have a history of polyps, chronic bowel disease or those who have a family history of colorectal cancer or polyps. Besides screening, there are also other ways to prevent colorectal cancer. Research has found a strong correlation between colorectal cancer prevention and a healthy lifestyle. Tips include: not smoking, avoiding consumption of red meat, not drinking alcohol, exercising regularly and watching your weight. Diet, being overweight, and physical inactivity has a greater chance of causing colon cancer than other types of cancer. There are some risk factors however, which a person cannot change. Hemoccult-ICT test kits are the first step in detecting colorectal cancer. This kit detects bleeding from the lower GI tract and is superior in detecting colorectal cancer. Talk to your health care professional regularly, and take advantage of the opportunity to start screening. Stop in to Outreach Services to pick up your FREE Colorectal screening kit today.
