MDH TEAM CELEBRATED: Inaugural Banquet Honors Milestones

On October 29, 2021, McDonough District Hospital honored 96 employees at its first-ever banquet celebrating Employee Years of Service, including one employee who reached an unprecedented milestone.

Board of Directors, administration, staff, and special guests in attendance congratulated Connie Starbuck, RN, who was recognized for 50 years at the Hospital.

Bill Corbin, Vice President for Human Resources, was the master of ceremonies. Brian E. Dietz, FACHE, President/ Chief Executive Officer, gave opening remarks, followed by remarks from Dr. Richard Iverson, Chairman of the MDH Board of Directors.

Captain Ron Pettigrew (USN), Program Director of the Western Illinois University Veterans Resource Center, gave the invocation.

Following dinner, Brian Dietz, Dr. Iverson, Dr. Edwin Card (MDH Chief Medical Officer), and MDH Vice Presidents Becky Paulsen (Foundation), Adrian MacGregor (Clinical and Support Services), Peter Rao (MDH Medical Group), Bill Murdock (Finance), Wanda Foster, RN, FACHE (Chief Nursing Officer), and Bill Corbin recognized employees who reached 5, 10, 15, 20, 25, 30, 35, 40, and 50 years of service.

Foster, who was recognized for 40 years of service, spoke on the contributions of Starbuck during her 50 years of service to MDH patients and leadership as a House Supervisor.

"We are excited to be celebrating our first-ever 50-year employee, and what a milestone achievement for Connie. At an early age, Connie had the gift of wanting to care for others. In her early teens and through high school, she cared for a retired schoolteacher," said Foster.

Starbuck graduated from Galesburg Cottage Hospital in the summer of 1968 and completed the three-year diploma program with perfect attendance. Thanks to scholarships from MDH and service organizations, she graduated debt-free and began her nursing career on MDH's surgical floor. She soon transferred to the Intensive Care Unit and worked in that area for 10 years.

Since 1979, Starbuck has worked as a House Supervisor during the overnight hours.

Healthcare runs in Starbuck's family. In fact, four of her family members are MDH colleagues – including her sister Peggy Jones, a Cardiopulmonary Nurse Practitioner. Several of Starbuck's family members were in attendance to help celebrate her milestone.

"Connie is one of our three dedicated

House Supervisors who work from 7 p.m. to 7 a.m., directing Hospital operations through the midnight hours. She pays close attention to details and is excellent with cardiac monitoring," said Foster.

"On top of this, Connie has excellent knowledge of the staff and their skill levels. She knows how to manage staffing to create a balanced workload, ensuring there is always the experience needed to provide the level of care our patients require. She sees the big picture and is a great mentor for new staff."

Since June 29, 1971, Connie Starbuck, RN, has been a providing nursing care for patients at McDonough District Hospital. She received an MDH scholarship and attended nurses'

training at Galesburg Cottage Hospital, where she earned a rare perfect attendance award.

Today, Starbuck is a trusted House Supervisor for the overnight shift. She was celebrated for her 50 years at MDH at the Employee Years of Service banquet.

Starbuck has always been a caregiver. As a youngster, she babysat a lot, once accompanying a mother and daughter to the children's hospital in Chicago. She also vividly remembers the day her younger sister fell and broke her arm, an injury that required surgery.

"I stayed with her overnight – that would never happen today," remembered Starbuck. "She was 7, and I was 14. My mom had to go home and take care of my other five brothers and sisters. At the time, my father was laid up with a broken leg. These are experiences that led to me choosing nursing as a career."

Throughout her teenage years, Starbuck held a variety of jobs. For a dollar a day, she stayed with a retired schoolteacher overnight. Part of that job was drawing up the teacher's insulin. She later became a candy striper at MDH, and her duties included cooking hamburgers and making milkshakes for staff in the coffee shop.

Starbuck began her nurses' training at age 17. When she started at MDH, she worked the night shift on the second floor. For eight years, she worked the night shift in the ICU. Since 1979, she has been a Nursing Supervisor and has worked all shifts (though nights are her favorite).

Over the years, Starbuck has witnessed many changes at MDH, from technology to uniforms. "I think of all the days I went to medical records looking for old charts. Even though it was organized, there were tricks to how they filed things. It's awesome to be able to get to everything on a computer," she said. "It's also so strange that the white uniforms and the nurses' caps are gone. It was a great honor to get that cap!" Though much has changed, many things have not. "The bedside care is similar to 40 or 50 years ago," said Starbuck. "You go to the patient, check their vitals, and it's still very hands-on. One thing I have found: I think the most important part of satisfying visitors or patients is being a good listener. Many times, by showing compassion and that you really care and are paying attention, people feel better, and the problem is solved."

Starbuck is far from the only medical professional in her family. Her daughter, Theresa, started out in nursing before changing directions to parks and recreation. Her other two children, Timothy and Christina, are nurses in Iowa. Two of Starbuck's younger sisters are also nurses, and several of her grandchildren are interested in the medical field.

"I feel like we're going to continue the medical careers in our family," said Starbuck. "If we get together, you better believe we're talking something medical – we don't know anything else!"

Starbuck doesn't have plans to retire any time soon, but she is taking a trip to Brazil. "My sister found out we have a cousin doing missionary work there," she shared. "They come back to the States to visit their churches. We met last May for the first time, and that's when we found out my cousin's wife is a retired nurse!"

As a young athlete, **Phyllis McLouth** suffered a knee injury. At that time, there weren't many options for sports medicine treatments. Nevertheless, she went through rehabilitation, much of it on her own.



This experience is the driving force behind McLouth's desire to offer the best sports medicine treatments and options in the region. She began her career as an aide before going to physical therapy school. Today, McLouth is the Director of MDH's Sports Medicine and Rehabilitation Services.

"I was involved in sports when I was in school, which was a motivator for learning. Sports were one reason to go to school. I do value that, and I recognize the importance with my kids as well," said McLouth.

"I have six kids, and each one participated in all kinds of sports throughout their school years," she continued. "I try to put myself in the athletes' shoes, the parents' shoes, and the clinicians' shoes. You join all those together to see how to get that athlete back into their sport at the best they can be."

Much has changed in the 30 years McLouth has worked at MDH. For example, athletic training coverage at the high school level was added in the 1990s. But one thing has stayed the same: making sure every athlete and patient receives the best care and treatment to get them back to what they love doing.

"We want to help reduce the severity of athletic injuries. I think that is a big deal. They tried back in the day, but they didn't have the information and knowledge we have now. With athletic trainers out there, they can help prevent serious injuries – not all of them, but many," stated McLouth. "It's one of the things we've worked at covering. We've had athletic trainers out in the field since the late 1990s. I think that's extremely important. If you can recognize an injury before it becomes severe, you can decrease the impact on that student's life when they are older. They may not have a life-altering injury."

Outside work, McLouth enjoys staying active, from playing piano for her church to hiking. She likes being outdoors and growing things, as well as helping her sister at her business, Hart's Nursery in Bushnell. There's also a sport McLouth has competed in that may surprise some.

"I used to do Olympic weightlifting – not for the Olympics, but I competed nationally in powerlifting," she said. "I had the opportunity to be coached by Judy and Roger Gedney at the Macomb Salvation Army. I was also coached in Peoria by someone who now coaches for USA Weightlifting." #



Deb Lawver, MDH's Home Health and Hospice Director, has achieved an impressive milestone: over 20 years working at the Hospital.

Lawver's ties to MDH run deep. She was actually born at the Hospital and raised in Macomb. She graduated from Macomb High School and started out her career as a CNA at MDH, simultaneously working on her nursing degree. Because she grew up in Macomb, Lawver understands the important role MDH plays in the community.

"MDH is a pillar in the community. I was born in this Hospital. I worked as a youngster in this Hospital, as a CNA working to become a nurse. There are many, many dedicated people at MDH. I feel very grateful that a community our size has such a facility," said Lawver. "The providers in our community are second to none. I think it's a good place to start your employment. It's a great place to grow as an employee, and I appreciate the longevity of our institution."

In addition to pursuing a career in healthcare, there was another focus for Lawver during her high school and collegiate days, and it's something that still plays a big part in her life: sports.

"Yes, that is an understatement. Because I'm older and short, you would be surprised to know that in college I was a two-sport athlete – volleyball and softball," joked Lawver, who attended Illinois Wesleyan University. "I have a hard time convincing people of that. They don't always believe me. I went to Illinois Wesleyan because they had a great nursing program, and they were a small enough university that I would not have to give up my ball playing. It was a good fit for me."

After returning home to Macomb, Lawver once again enjoyed both her passions – healthcare and sports.

"When I first came back to Macomb, I worked on the Skilled Nursing Unit because there were no openings in Home Health and Hospice. When there was an opening, I moved to that department. I left for a short time to work on some projects in our outpatient clinics, then came back to what I truly love: Home Health and Hospice," said Lawver.

She also enjoyed watching her kids get involved at Macomb High. "We had a great social life in the bleachers. Of course, I am a graduate and played a lot of sports there. Having our kids involved in some of those same activities – those were the fun days."

And with the children all grown up now, does Lawver still enjoy sports?

"My husband laughs sometimes – he tells me I check NFL scores more than he does. Now, we spend a lot of our free time at sporting events, taking in a lot of different activities."

Since joining the MDH Human Resources department in 2010, **Tobie Richey** has taken on different roles.

She began as a recruiter and worked for eight years in that role. She transitioned into the role of Benefits Coordinator. Following a title

change, she is now the HR Generalist. In fact, during the early days of the COVID-19 pandemic, she worked two different times as the interim Human Resources Director.

"The most fun thing about my job is my co-workers. We find a way to make HR fun and enjoyable," said Richey.

The best part of her job?

"The best part of my job is helping people with whatever questions they have and helping them find the answers."

A native of Vermont and graduate of VIT High School, Richey graduated from Western Illinois University with a bachelor's degree in business. During her WIU years, she discovered the Human Resources component within business.

"What got me started in Human Resources was the customer service aspect. I came from a food services background and through college went into business. I decided that I kind of liked both the business side of things and the customer service side of things, which led me to Human Resources."

Even during her relatively short time working in Human Resources, she has seen the profession change.

"When I first started as a recruiter in 2010, we had paper applications for at least a year before we transitioned to an online application. On the recruitment side, we went from paper to using and learning two different applicant tracking systems," said Richey. "Moving into the benefits role, everything is always changing. From the laws, to rules and regulations, and keeping up with minimum wage ... it is a challenge. We have resources to help us with that, including our third-party administrator, the Society of Human Resources Management, and different notices sent out to us to make sure we are not missing anything."

Richey played sports growing up, and her fiancée, Jorge Macias, was also active in sports. It's no surprise that their children are following in their footsteps.

"Jorge and I have been engaged 10 years. Our oldest

daughter, Taryn (Richey), is very active in varsity golf at Macomb High School. We have twin nine-year-olds. Both Braelyn and Braxton (Macias) play travel softball and travel baseball. Braxton is in basketball, and Braelyn really enjoys tumbling and anything active."

BEST OF THE BEST MDH Takes Top Spots in Four Categories

Being voted to receive a Best of the Best Award, in any category, is quite an honor.

Two years in a row, impressive.

Three years? Outstanding.

IN DECEMBER, the MDH Home Health and Sports Medicine and Rehabilitation Services teams received 2021 Best of the Best Awards for McDonough County. That makes FIVE consecutive years these MDH organizations were voted top choice in the county.

The MDH team described the feeling of winning five straight years:

"Grateful," said Phyllis McLouth, Director of MDH Sports Medicine and Rehabilitation Services.

"Unwavering," said Deb Lawver,

Director of MDH Home Health and Hospice.

Home Health covers McDonough County and the majority of the four surrounding counties.

"When I was asked how it felt – winning this award for five consecutive years -I thought unwavering, especially being able to maintain superior work despite dealing with COVID-19 the last couple of years," said Lawver. "The staff we have at MDH Home Health is very dedicated. They are highly skilled. The group we have working in our department is one of the strongest I have ever had the privilege to work with. They represent a variety of nursing skills, and they are advocates for their patients. They work hard and represent MDH while always going to bat for their patients.

"We also have some long-term employees, and we've seen patients at various stages of their lives," she continued. "Many patients have used our services once, recovered, and left us for a while, and then have come back and requested us again. That's very gratifying, and it's also satisfying for our patients, to already have that relationship."

According to MDH Vice President/ Chief Nursing Officer Wanda Foster, "MDH Home Health Care has been at the forefront of providing outstanding, patient-centered care in the home setting for many years. Our dedicated staff works diligently to ensure our skilled nursing care, physical therapy, occupational therapy, speech therapy, social work, and certified nurse aid care is provided to the utmost standards of clinical excellence.

"Congratulations to the MDH Home Health Care team for this outstanding achievement!" concluded Foster.

If a patient meets the criteria for home health care, there is a long list of conditions and treatments the MDH team provides. Post-hospitalization care, wound care, home IV infusion, COPD, CHF, diabetes, physical strengthening, and skills to gain independence with daily living activities are just a few. Home Health staff also provide a great deal of education to best position the patient for success at home.

Lawver noted working in Home Health gives you a special perspective of patients, one not normally experienced working with an inpatient.

"In Home Health and Hospice, you see the entire patient. You get the patient, every caregiver, every person who crosses paths with them and enters their home, pets, the whole package," she said.

"Sometimes that makes the whole experience extremely enjoyable, and sometimes it presents even more challenges. I always say that seeing the patient in the home setting is the true, true picture of who they are and the person they've become over the years. It is a perfect combination as far as I'm concerned."

Lawver continued, "We start our care with patients at a time they may be healing as opposed to the shorter hospital stays. We get to spend a little more time with patients as we help them recover and rehab. We are working on things that are vitally important to them since they need to be fully functioning in their home setting. We get to learn about their priorities and what motivates them, and often patients are most motivated in their own homes. Seeing them progress and achieve those goals is very rewarding."

Sports Medicine and Rehabilitation accepts patients from anywhere in the tri-state area.

"Winning this award for five consecutive years makes us driven and inspired to continue meeting the needs and exceeding the expectations of the community," said McLouth.

With locations on the 3rd floor of the Hospital, on the corner of North Lafayette and University Drive in Macomb, and inside the Bushnell Family Practice, the MDH Sports Medicine and Rehabilitation team provides a very diverse set of services. "They're all very much related. Our primary focus is function," said McLouth. "Physical therapy is our strong base; it has been offered the longest. Occupational therapy is very closely related to PT, because it's working with the activities of daily living."

Another example of how therapies are often symbiotic is diabetes education, an important and more recent addition to their lineup. "Diabetes is very prevalent amongst people in our community. That we now offer education ties in with wound care; if diabetic wounds are properly managed, including patient education, the severity of those wounds can be decreased," explained McLouth. "Our cardiac rehab team also ties into diabetes, because with diabetes, you often have cardiac disease."

Being diverse enough to continually bring new therapies to patients is rewarding for McLouth and her team. "Dry needling is a new tool in our toolbox. It's not completely new, but relatively new to the physical therapy profession. It provides a new method by which we can help reduce pain in patients so they can move better," she explained.

The COVID-19 pandemic brought challenges to McLouth and her staff. Thanks to TeleHealth appointments, additional safety precautions, and most importantly, the perseverance of the Sports Medicine and Rehabilitation team, MDH was able to continue meeting the needs of its patients.

"We are a vital service for people. People need to keep moving to stay healthy," said McLouth. "A patient may come in struggling and actually sometimes fearful because they don't know what we are going to do.

"Seeing them return to what they really want to be doing – and it can range anywhere from being able to stand up from a chair, walking, going to a wedding with their family – there's satisfaction every day in helping people make improvements and return to their best."

MDH Completes Major Renovation of Health Services Building 1

FOR THE FIRST TIME in over 15 years, Health Services Building 1 has undergone a major renovation.

The 12-month project began with the MDH OB/GYN Clinic moving to the 3rd floor of the Hospital in January 2021, so construction could begin. Work is now complete, and the Springfield Clinic of Macomb has doubled in square footage. It now takes up the entire west side of the 1st floor of Health Services Building 1.

The expansion project began as a conversation between Springfield Clinic providers and leadership at MDH.

"Our Springfield partners wanted to improve their clinic space, as they were continuing to

recruit more physicians and nurse practitioners," said Adrian MacGregor, MDH Vice President for Clinical and Support Services. "MDH wanted to not only meet the needs of Springfield Clinic's expanding staff, but also to make services more accessible to patients within the MDH Medical Group, including the Convenience Clinic." At the clinic, adjustments had to be made during the construction phase. "It was worth the wait, though it was kind of painful at times," said Curtis Farr, MD, a family

practice physician with Springfield Clinic and a member of the MDH Board of Directors. "There was noise one wall over. I'd be trying to listen to someone's heart, and I couldn't hear it because there was pounding and thudding on the other side of the wall. But you get through it.

"The construction guys from O'Shea Builders did an awesome job," he continued. "They were great to work around, and they kept things clean. It wasn't dusty. They did their best to warn us if it was going to be really noisy, or if there was going to be a water shutoff. They tried to work around our hours

as well. A lot of times, I'd come back in the evening and they would be working. They were very professional, and you can see they did a great job."

In addition to the added space for the Springfield Clinic, a new Radiology Imaging Suite was built on the 2nd floor of

Health Services Building 1, offering a convenient location for outpatient X-ray needs. The suite officially opened on March 14.

"Outpatients will be able to receive imaging examinations without coming inside the Hospital," said Milton Griffin, Director of MDH Radiology. "The convenience will be a major patient satisfier."

"Many times, I have had to ask a nurse to wheel someone over to the Hospital to get their X-ray. If we can bring them upstairs, and I can get results even quicker, it's nice," added Dr. Farr. "It'll be especially beneficial with the weather around here – you never know what you're going to get. We won't have to send them out on a rainy or snowy day to run across the parking lot and get a film. This is much more efficient for everyone, and I believe it will be a positive patient experience."

MacGregor spoke more on the benefits of the new suite. "The HSB 1 Radiology Imaging Suite has been a great project. A well-designed, high-quality suite has been developed to meet basic Radiology needs for patients coming from either Health Services Building 1 or Health Services Building 2.


"At MDH, approximately 85 percent of all our business is outpatient directed. We have approximately 300 patients daily visiting Health Services Buildings 1 and 2 for a variety of services," continued MacGregor. "The Radiology suite is a natural alignment, ensuring patients do not have to travel any farther on the MDH campus for an X-ray. We're thrilled to provide this level of convenience for our patients."

The Radiology Imaging Suite is open Monday through Friday from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. It is available to all patients.

Initial feedback from patients on the renovation of Health Services Building 1 has been extremely positive. "We're all very appreciative of what the Hospital has provided to us," concluded Dr. Farr. "It's a win-win for everybody. We do better when the Hospital does better, and vice versa. Every provider has three rooms, plus five minor surgery rooms. It's going to be good for everyone in the future."

People living with chronic rhinitis or nasal obstruction may have a better path to long-term correction and health, and these cutting-edge, non-surgical procedures are being performed by the McDonough District Hospital Ear, Nose and Throat team.

TWO NEW PROCEDURES – VivAer[®] treatment for nasal obstruction and RhinAer[®] treatment for chronic rhinitis – are both non-invasive and completed in the MDH ENT office. Patients typically return to normal activities the same day.

"Before this, people were unable to obtain lasting results with medical treatments, or required more invasive surgery," said Dr. Jeffrey Sparks. "The VivAer and RhinAer treatments are clinically proven to improve the quality of life for patients, getting relief that lasts for these frustrating conditions after a procedure that's only minimally discomforting."

Twin Sisters on Duty in the Emergency Room

MDH EMERGENCY ROOM doctors Molly and Tessa Payant McKenna are used to getting second glances when they're working. After all, it's not too often you have identical twins working in the same specialty at the same hospital ... often at the same time!

Molly and Tessa are the fifth and sixth of the eight children in their family. Their careers have often mirrored each other, both graduating from the University of Wisconsin, then attending medical school at Florida State. The sisters did general surgery residencies, followed by emergency medicine residencies at Case Western Reserve.

Their reasons for pursuing careers in medicine are nearly identical too.

"Our parents encouraged us to do things to help other people," said Molly. "So when Tessa and I were in fourth grade, we decided we wanted to become doctors. Our grandfather was a doctor, practicing family medicine."
